1. What Sitavia is and what it is used for

Sitavia contains the active substance sitagliptin which is a member of a class of medicines called DPP-4 inhibitors (dipeptidyl peptidase-4 inhibitors) that lowers blood sugar levels in adult patients with type 2 diabetes mellitus.
This medicine helps to increase the levels of insulin produced after a

meal and decreases the amount of sugar made by the body. Your doctor has prescribed this medicine to help lower your blood sugar, which is too high because of your type 2 diabetes. This medicine can be used alone or in combination with certain other medicines can be used active of in command with eartern other headeness (insulin, metformin, sulphonylureas, or glitazones) that lower blood sugar, which you may already be taking for your diabetes together with a food and exercise plan.

What is type 2 diabetes?

Type 2 diabetes is a condition in which your body does not make enough insulin, and the insulin that your body produces does not work as well as it should. Your body can also make too much sugar.

When this happens, sugar (glucose) builds up in the blood. This can lead to serious medical problems like heart disease, kidney disease, blindness, and amputation.

Do not take Sitavia

if you are allergic to sitagliptin or any of the other ingredients of this medicine (listed in section 6).

Warnings and precautions

Cases of inflammation of the pancreas (pancreatitis) have been report-

This medicine is unlikely to cause low blood sugar because it does not work when your blood sugar is low. However, when this medicine is used in combination with a sulphonylurea medicine or with insulin, lo blood sugar (hypoglycaemia) can occur. Your doctor may reduce the dose of your sulphonylurea or insulin medicine

Other medicines and Sitavia
Tell your doctor or pharmacist if you are taking, have recently taken or might take any other medicines.

In particular, tell your doctor if you are taking digoxin (a medicine used to treat irregular heart beat and other heart problems). The level of digoxin in your blood may need to be checked if taking with **Sitavia**.

Children and adolescents

Children and adolescents Children and adolescents below 18 years should not use this medicine. It is not known if this medicine is safe and effective when used in children and adolescents under 18 years of age.

Pregnancy and breastfeeding
If you are pregnant or breastfeeding, think you may be pregnant or planning to have a baby, ask your doctor or pharmacist for advice before taking this medicine.

You should not take this medicine during pregnancy.

It is not known if this medicine passes into breast milk. You should not

take this medicine if you are breast-feeding or plan to breast-feed. **Driving and using machines**This medicine has no or negligible influence on the ability to drive and use machines. However, dizziness and drowsiness have been report-

de machines. Tweeter, uzzimes and utowaless has been reported, which may affect your ability to drive or use machines.

Taking this medicine in combination with medicines called sulphonytureas or with insulin can cause hypoglycaemia, which may affect your
ability to drive and use machines or work without safe foothold.

3. How to take Sitavia

Always take this medicine exactly as your doctor has told you. Check with your doctor or pharmacist if you are not sure. The usual recommended dose is:

• one 100 mg film-coated tablet

- once a day

by mouth

If you have kidney problems, your doctor may prescribe lower doses (such as 25 mg or 50 mg).

You can take this medicine with or without food and drink.

Your doctor may prescribe this medicine alone or with certain other medicines that lower blood sugar.

Diet and exercise can help your body use its blood sugar better. It is important to stay on the diet and exercise recommended by your doctor while taking Sitavia.

If you take more Sitavia than you should If you take more than the prescribed dosage of this medicine, contact your doctor immediately.

If you forget to take Sitavia

If you miss a dose, take it as soon as you remember. If you do not remember until it is time for your next dose, skip the missed dose and go back to your regular schedule. Do not take a double dose of this

If you stop taking Sitavia

Continue to take this medicine as long as your doctor prescribes it so you can continue to help control your blood sugar. You should not stop taking this medicine without talking to your doctor first.

If you have any further questions on the use of this medicine, ask your doctor or pharmacist.

4. Possible side effects

Like all medicines, this medicine can cause side effects, although not

everybody gets them.

STOP taking Sitavia and contact a doctor immediately if you notice any of the following serious side effects:

of the following serious side effects:

Severe and persistent pain in the abdomen (stomach area) which might reach through to your back with or without nausea and vomiting, as these could be signs of an inflamed pancreas (pancreatitis). If you have a serious allergic reaction (frequency not known), including rash, hives, blisters on the skin/peeling skin and swelling of the face, lips, tongue, and throat that may cause difficulty in breathing or swallowing, stop taking this medicine and call your doctor right away. Your doctor may exercibe a medicine to treat your allergic reaction and a lowing, stop taking this medicine and call your doctor right away. -Some patients have experienced the following side effects after adding sitagliptin to metformin:

Common (may affect up to 1 in 10 people): low blood sugar, nausea, flatulence, vomiting.

Uncommon (may affect up to 1 in 100 people): stomach ache, diarrhoea, constipation, drowsiness.

Uncommon: dry mouth.
-Some patients have experienced the following side effects while taking sitagliptin alone in clinical studies, or during post-approval use

taking sitagipin alone in clinical studies, or during post-approval use alone and/or with other diabetes medicines:

Common: low blood sugar, headache, upper respiratory infection, stuffy or runny nose and sore throat, osteoarthritis, arm or leg pain.

Uncommon: dizziness, constipation, itching

Rare: reduced number of platelets

Frequency not known: kidney problems (sometimes requiring dialysis), vomiting, joint pain, muscle pain, back pain, interstitial lung disease, bullous nemphiconi (4 stupen of skin bileter).

5. How to store Sitavia

- · Keep this medicine out of the sight and reach of children.
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 Store below 30°C.
 Do not use this medicine after the expiry date which is stated on the label and carton. The expiry date refers to the last day of that month.
 Do not throw away any medicines via wastewater or household waste. Ask your pharmacist how to throw away medicines if you no longer use. These measures will help to protect the environment.

The active substance is sitagliptin.
Each film-coated tablet contains:

Sitagliptin Phosphate Monohydrate, equivalent to 100 mg Sitagliptin.

The other ingredients are: In the tablet core: Dibasic calcium phosphate Anhydrous, Microcrystalline Cellulose, Croscarmellose sodium, Sodium Stearyl fumarate, Magnesium stearate. The tablet film coating contains: Polyvinyl alcohol, Macrogol, Talc, Yellow iron oxide, Titanium dioxide. Bed iron oxide. dioxide. Red iron oxide.

Sitavia 50 mg: Light beige color, round, biconvex film-coated tablet debossed with C3 on one side and plain on other side.

Sitavia 100 mg: Brownish orange, round, biconvex, film-coated tablet

plain on both sides. Pack size: 30 film-coated tablets.
